How to be the Church When You Can't Go to Church

I hope that this finds you well, and in good spirits. I know that each of our unique experiences around this new world has been difficult. I did despair for a day, letting my own fears and stress get the better of me. After a nice nap and a walk, something struck me as I walked with my family around the neighborhood. God doesn't just 'know' what is going on, He wants me to thrive in what is going on. To take advantage of this time. So my attitude and my resolve changed for the better in that moment.

There were three things I had to recognize to get to that good place. The first thing to recognize is that "Your circle of influence has changed." There is no telling what the future holds, but what is more likely is that our world is going to change a bit. Social distancing may become part of the new normal (haha to all you huggers!). Your circle of influence, or the people whose lives you can directly impact their concerns and their successes, has changed and in some cases it has narrowed.

The second thing to recognize is that "Your mission field has changed." We aren't going and traveling the same way we used to. And de-

pending on your level of "at risk", you may be limited to where and how you can actually love and reach His people.


The last thing we need to recognize is that "God is still God, and the great commission is still the goal." Jesus didn't say that "if it's hard" or "if it's crazy times" stay at home and watch all the shows you didn't have time to watch before. He said Go and Make disciples... Teaching them Everything!

So with all of that said, how can we do this? Whether your circle of influence is the family you live with, the friends you call/text, or maybe your neighbors, God wants you to reach out to that person or persons and love on them. Pray for them, or better yet call (or Zoom) them to find

out what they are struggling with and pray with them. Send them a card, text, or send them a meal on Doordash, bitesquad, any pizza place, etc... You can do all of that without actually physically being there.

When we consider your mission field this can be a little more tricky. Micah Powell called me the other day, and gave me some creative ideas to consider. You can drive by your friends home, call or text them that you are out there and praying for them. If you're feeling exceptionally friendly, you could get out and talk to them from a safe distance. If you don't feel like driving around, you can walk your neighborhood and pray for you neighborhood, pray for each house. If they are out there, and you have never talked to them, now's the time. How are they doing, do they have family, do they need anything, how can you pray for them?

The Great commission didn't change. Christians should be the model of compassion and resolve in this time. We have freedom knowing that in any environment, Jesus is Lord forever and ever. God wants you to seize this time, Love His People.



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
